# EEF's Doyle-Meidinger Fund Provides Ongoing STEM Funds

Evansville schools now have an ongoing resource for STEM subjects (Science, Technology, Engineering, and Match). The Evansville Education Foundation (EEF) recently established the Theresa Doyle-Meidinger STEM Endowment Fund, which will provide money for STEM programs every year, in perpetuity, from the interest it earns.

The fund was named for Teresa Doyle-Meidinger, who served the school district for twenty years as a Resource Teacher for Advanced Learners and a Reading Specialist. Major donors Cecile David and Steve Diebold decided to name the fund after her because "Teresa Doyle-Meidinger [was] a constant advocate in our kids' schooling, always challenging and encouraging them to do their best. Teresa was very supportive in engaging kids in after-school activities, helping...establish the chess club, robotics club, and science clubs in grades 3-8, Science Olympiad in middle school and high school, and the math team and robotics team in high school." Other generous donors include Bill Kasten, Nancy and Jim Hurley, and many other individuals in the community.

Currently the fund, which is managed by the Community Foundation of Southern Wisconsin, contains \$10,000, which the EEF expects will create about \$500 per year in interest for the school district. That amount doesn't fully cover the school district's needs, so the EEF continues to accept donations of any amount. 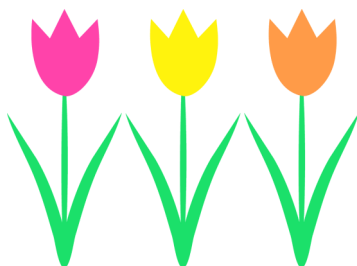

## Summertime mental health:



For many students, summer is a time to relax, unwind and take a break. While having free time can be beneficial, time away from the routine of school can also sometimes be stressful. For some students, a wide open schedule with lots of available options is a welcome change. For students who are highly anxious, too much time and too many choices can increase feelings of anxiety. Some students experience feelings of depression during the summer when their contacts with peers decreases compared to their time spent together during the school year. Students may get restless or bored without the short term goals to accomplish like they would in classes. Some might miss their connections with supportive staff or peers they came to trust during the school year. The idea of a perfect summer can be overwhelming – social media can make others’ experiences look like a dream and students can be tempted to compare or feel insecure.

What can you do to support positive mental health for your son/daughter during the summer?

What can you do to support positive mental health for your son/daughter during the summer?

1. Limit screen time—an article from Psychology Today\* indicates that too much screen time overstimulates the nervous system and creates a state of chronic stress that affects the brain.
2. Encourage exercise—the benefits of regular exercise to both physical and mental health have been well documented.
3. Plan meals ahead of time—while having snack food (chips, cookies, etc.) once in a while is not a problem, too much food with little or no nutrition value impacts physical and mental health.
4. Maintain a routine—having a schedule gives structure to the summer, helps students know what to expect, and provides things to look forward to. This can reduce symptoms of depression and anxiety.
5. Provide supervision guidelines—middle school students are naturally trying to gain their independence, but too much time with little or no adult supervision can contribute to teenagers making poor decisions.
6. Encourage regular sleep patterns—the National Sleep Foundation\*\* has noted the effects of too much or too little sleep.
7. Emphasize in-person interactions—an article in US News and World Reports\*\*\* describes research from 2017 stating “adolescents who spent more time on new media, such as social media platforms and smartphones, were more likely to report mental health issues. Conversely, adolescents who spent more time off technology and on in-person social interaction, sports and exercise, homework, print media and attending religious services were less likely to report such issues.”



As the school year winds down, take some time to plan for a smooth transition to summer break. We look forward to hearing about all the great things everyone did over the summer when we return to the school year in September of 2018!

The Eager Free Public Library has an amazing summer reading program for teens. Sign-up begins May 26<sup>th</sup> at 9:30am. They will purchase a new book for every 20 hours teens read. Readers may complete up to 3 reading logs for a total of 60 hours read and 3 book prizes earned! In addition they have fabulous programs, like Rock Painting, Cereal Taste Test, Zentangle Drawing and more.

Lastly, we invite middle school students to participate in the Little Free Library Challenge this summer! Evansville has fourteen registered Little Free Libraries (LFL) in our community. Students are challenged to stop by each LFL during the summer, write a brief description about each one, borrow at least one book and write a book review about the book they borrowed. LFL Challenge sheets will be available in the LMC in May. Students who return a completed challenge sheet to the LMC in September will receive a prize. We hope this activity inspires students to read and explore their community.

## 6th Grade Social Studies

Our World War 2 unit is always interesting because of the background knowledge that many students bring, and the family connections that sixth graders are able to make. Over the last several weeks, students have been learning important events of this incredible, terrible time, especially focusing on the

Homefront in the USA. We visited websites to learn about the internment of Japanese-Americans, found out about "Rosie the Riveter", and explored ways that Americans rationed goods. Each class also explored primary sources, organizing well-known photographs of important events, as well as checking out old newspapers and artifacts from the Wis-

consin Veterans Museum.

Sixth graders recently wrote letters to WW2 veterans to contribute to the "VetsRoll" program, and they have also been mastering their the map of the world. During the rest of 4<sup>th</sup> quarter, we're looking forward to our Civil War Day in Milton on May 19th, and our final unit on the Civil Rights Movement.

**Regular math** classes are beginning Chapter 9 of BIG IDEAS. Chapter 9 is the study of mean, median and mode, along with mean absolute deviation. Students will be using mean to find the MAD. We will also look at which measures work best with different situations. Chapter 10 will be all about data. Stem and leaf plots, histograms and box and whisker plots will be explored. Ask your child if they have done any math extra credit. Check out my YouTube lessons for extra practice or help on math skills. Calculators will be used in this chapter! Please make sure your child has a calculator at school.

**Advanced Math** students will be working with a formula unit in Chapter 9 of BIG IDEAS. Students will be working with the formulas for surface area and volume of prisms and pyramids. Chapter 10 will be all about probability and statistics. Check out my YouTube lessons for extra practice or help on math skills. Calculators will be used in this chapter! Please make sure your child has a calculator at school.

**Math Meet Team** has been working hard with weekly practices after school. The 5/6 Math Meet Team took first place at their

competition in April. The team is currently prepping their math skills for the Mega Math Meet on Thursday, May 10, 2018. Good Luck, Math Meet Team!!!

Sixth graders have just started a new Lucy Calkins unit entitled Tapping the Power of Nonfiction. This unit will focus on specific, nonfiction reading strategies which can help students in virtually every academic discipline. Topics include discerning central ideas, summarizing, synthesizing within and across texts, building vocabulary, growing ideas, and reading critically to question the author's point-of-view and perspective. Civil Rights is the next theme of our final novel unit. Students will choose from a large number of possible texts for this important unit that will also support what they will be learning in S.S. Sixth graders are also writing a children's book which they will be illustrating and sharing with second graders later this spring. Students will include in their books a brief synopsis of their story, a title and dedication page, a minimum of seven illustrations, and finally, a short autobiography of themselves. As mentioned in a letter sent home, "Bare Books" are hard covered blank books that your child can publish and illustrate his/her story in. They are available for \$3.00, and make wonderful Mother's & Father's Day gifts.. If you would like your child to have one, please send the money and order in by early May.

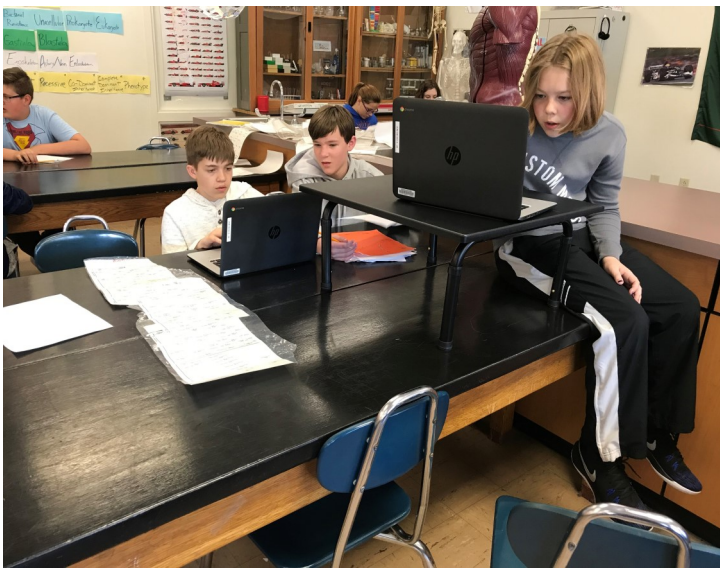
## Science

# 8th Grade News

## Composition/Literature

8th grade ELA is working on finishing up their historical fiction reading unit. They have been learning about how their characters dealt with conflict in WWII and the Holocaust. This unit has also helped students learn about this time in history and build more background knowledge. Next up, students will be studying dystopian literature. A dystopian society is when the society is in extremely bad condition and run down environmentally and by the government. In this unit, students will be reading multiple books across a series and tracking how their character deals with life within their society.

## Science

Our next two chapters are about Fossils, Relative and Absolute (Radioactive) Dating, and a look back into Earth's past with the Earth History Time Line.
